SURVEY PURPOSE AND DESCRIPTION

The mission of the Spider Chain of Lakes Association ("Association" or "SCLA") is a shared responsibility to preserve and protect the Spider Chain of Lakes for future generations. A primary focus of SCLA is preventing, detecting, and responding to invasive species by broadening the community's understanding of AIS threats through education, monitoring landings and lakes, and addressing invasive species through various strategies when needed.

In spring 2020, the Association was awarded a \$21,500 DNR grant to develop a Comprehensive Lake Management Plan to address water quality, aquatic plant management, lake habitat, and other management and social considerations for the long-term health of the Spider Chain of Lakes. Goal 1 of the plan is to understand lake residents' concerns, perceptions, and motivations to enhance lake protection and increase involvement in the Spider Chain of Lakes Association. To this end, a sociological survey was created and administered to all shoreland property owners. The survey was designed to assess the attitudes and cultural behaviors that promote and impede the Association's lake protection efforts. The survey is made-up of seven blocks:

- Survey Narrative. Provided an explanation of the purpose of the survey
- Participant Residency. Description of residency, tenure on the lake chain, and introduction to the lake chain
- SCLA Participation and Perspectives. Rating satisfaction and importance of a number of SCLA activities. Self-assessment of participation and willingness to participate
- Participation and Lake Use. Data on preferred lake activities and inventory of motorized and non-motorized watercrafts
- *Fishing and Fishery Management.* Interest in fishing, species preference, and attitudes about fishery management.
- Attitudes about the Lake. Level of agreement related to physical characteristics of the lake, preferences about lake views, and concerns related to water quality
- Personal Views. Open-ended responses to the following questions: (1) List the three most important things to you about the Spider Chain. (2) List the three most important things that need to happen on the Spider Chain in the next 2 to 5 years. (3) Non-member survey only: According to our records, you are not currently a member of the Spider Chain of Lakes Association. If there is a specific reason for that decision, please share that with us

The shoreland property owner survey varied in length depending on the Association membership status of the survey recipient. The Association member survey ("member survey") was a 21-item survey consisting of 19 multiple-choice items and 2 open-ended items. This survey was administered using an online link. The non-member shoreland property owner survey ("non-member survey") was a 17-item survey consisting of 14 multiple-choice items and 3 open-ended items. The non-member survey was administered as a mail-in, paper survey. The non-member mailing contained three items: a survey cover letter explaining the purpose of the survey and survey instructions, the 4-page survey, and a postage-paid return envelope.¹

¹ Surveys differed in length. The member survey added five questions about the Association, which were not asked on the non-member survey. The non-member survey asked an additional open-ended question about why they were not SCLA members.

All survey recipients were notified that survey responses were confidential and that respondents would not be identifiable by their responses. Survey recipients also received contact information for the survey administrator, should they have questions or concerns.

SURVEY ADMINISTRATION

The member survey was administered using an email link. Prior to receiving the survey link, a preannouncement message was emailed to all SCLA members on June 15, 2020. The link to the survey was sent out to all 308 SCLA members two days later, on June 17. Two reminder messages were sent out in the same manner on July 8, 2020 and July 25, 2020. Survey administrators requested that only one member of each household complete the SCLA Shoreland Property Owners survey. One hundred nineteen (119) of the 165 Association households completed the online survey (response rate of 72%).

Seventy-four non-member shoreland property owners received a paper copy of the non-member survey.² By the July 31 deadline, 32 of the 74 non-members had completed and returned the survey (response rate of 43%).

One hundred fifty-one individuals completed the survey (n=151) and the combined response rate for all shoreland owners, members and non-members, was 63%. This response rate has a margin of error of 5% with a confidence level of 95%. This means that the reported values for any given item on the survey will fall within \pm 5% of the true percentage for the population, 95% of the time. Based on the relatively high response rate, the calculated margin of error, and the confidence level, it is likely that the survey findings for this sample will be representative of the views of most shoreland property owners on the Spider Chain.

SURVEY RESULTS

The survey results we present in this section are based upon the combined responses of the member and non-member surveys.⁵ Each table or figure is preceded by a brief narrative that summarizes the data for that table or figure. In Appendix A, we present all responses (as both percentages and counts) for the tables that are presented as *Figures* in the report.

Owner Characteristics

How the residence at the property is used. Fifty percent of respondents (50%) reside on the Spider Chain mainly on the weekends (summers only, 11%; weekends throughout the year, 39%). Twenty-three percent of respondents (23%) report that they reside on the lake throughout the summer and more throughout the year. About one in five respondents (17%) state that they are year-round residents and only one of every 100 respondents principally use their residence as a rental property (see Table 1).

³ Several crosstab analyses were performed. We found no significant differences between the responses of association members and non-members, so the response samples were combined.

⁵ As stated earlier, our analyses found no significant differences when comparing the responses of members and non-member respondents, so the data are presented together.




Figure 1. Number of years you have owned your property (n=151)

Years of shoreland property ownership. The figure below summarizes the length of time respondents have been shoreland property owners on the Spider chain (see Figure 1). A large percentage of respondents (86%) have owned their property for six or more years (6 to 10 years, 16%; 11 to 15 years, 9%; 16 or more years, 61%), while 14% of respondents have owned their property for five or fewer years (<1 year, 2%; 1 to 5 years, 12%).

Years of Shoreland Property Ownership

First Visit to the Spider Chain. The table below shows that about 90% of the current shoreland property owners first came to the Spider chain as guests, land owners, or as children or relatives of previous owners. The remaining 9% first came to the Spider chain as renters and later purchased land (see Table 2).

SCLA Participation and Perspectives




Figure 2. SCLA Affiliation Status (n=151)

SCLA Affiliation Status. Eighty-one percent of the individuals who responded to the survey said that they were current members of the Association and 15% said that they had never been members. Five respondents said that they had been members of the Association in the past, but were no longer (1%), or were unsure of their membership status in the Association (2%) (see Figure 2).

SCLA Meeting Attendance. Based on the responses of 106 respondents, meeting attendance for SCLA members varied broadly with about one-third of respondents (34%) saying they never attended meetings, 27% indicating that they attended every few years, 17% saying that they attend every year, and 22% saying that they attend more than one time every year (see Table 3).

Satisfaction with Association Activities and Efforts. One hundred five Association members (105) responded to a question asking them to identify their level of satisfaction with eight Association efforts or activities (the Annual Memorial Day meeting; control of aquatic invasive species; social and educational activities that are offered throughout the year; the 4th of July parade and social float; the Annual Labor Day picnic; the SCLA website, Spider Lines, the semi-annual electronic newsletter; and SCLA Updates, the monthly electronic briefs). Response choices were: very dissatisfied, dissatisfied, neither dissatisfied nor satisfied, satisfied, and very satisfied.

The level of satisfaction (respondents who selected either *satisfied* or *very satisfied*) ranged between 57% to 97%. The activities and efforts receiving the highest levels of satisfaction were: The *Spider Lines* newsletter (97%), the SCLA monthly updates (94%), and the control of aquatic invasive species (93%). Member respondents were also very satisfied with the SCLA website. Eighty-seven percent of member respondents (87%) viewed the website satisfactorily (see Table 4).

Importance of Association Activities and Efforts. Association members were asked to rate the same eight activities listed in Table 4, but this time based on the importance of those activities (very unimportant, unimportant, neither unimportant nor important, important, and very important). The four activities receiving the highest levels of satisfaction were also considered to be the most important (individuals who selected either important or very important). The top four activities were the control of aquatic invasive species (96%), the Spider Lines newsletter (96%), the SCLA monthly updates (93%), and the SCLA website (91%) (see Table 5).

Willingness to Provide Support to the Association. SCLA members were asked how willing they would be to provide financial support, over and above the \$25 membership dues, through tier-level support or gifts to the endowment and emergency operating fund. Members were also asked how willing they would be to provide hands-on support by volunteering to serve on the Board, committees, or projects. Response options were not wiling at all, somewhat willing, very willing, and doing it now. Fifty-two percent of member respondents (52%) reported that they were already providing financial support in addition to their membership fees and 29% said that they were already contributing to the Association through volunteering. Fewer than 10% of the respondents were very willing to provide additional support in these ways. Over one-third were somewhat willing to provide additional financial support (36%) or hands-on support (43%). Only 5% of the individuals who responded to this item said that they were not willing at all to provide additional financial support, while about one-fifth (21%) were not willing at all to serve the Association through volunteerism (see Table 6).

Non-members of the Association. One additional open-ended question was asked on the non-member survey to better understand why shoreland property owners choose <u>not</u> to become members of the Spider Chain of Lakes Association. The open-ended item stated, "According to our records, you are not currently a member of the Spider Chain of Lakes Association. If there is a specific reason for that decision, please share that with us." Twenty-two of the 32 non-member households who completed and returned the non-member survey responded to this item (69% response rate). The 22 responses were analyzed thematically and grouped into the nine categories listed below (see Table 7).

Participation and Lake Use




Figure 3. Willingness to Support Environmental and Ecological Practices (n=138 to 140)

Willingness to Support Environmental and Ecological Practices. In Figure 3 below, we asked shoreland property owners about their willingness to support seven environmental and ecological practices to improve animal habitat and water quality. Eliminating the use of lead-containing fish weights and lures

received the highest level of support with 51% of respondents reporting that they had already eliminated the use of lead-containing weights and lures and 29% indicating that they were *very willing* to do so. Seventy-one percent (71%) of the survey respondents indicated that they were supportive of altering their lawn practices and shoreline plantings to protect the quality of the Spider Chain (42% *doing it now*, 29% *very willing*). Fifty-three percent said that they were willing to support efforts to protect the ecological health of the Spider Chain if it meant limiting their current use of, or activities on, the lake (21% *doing it now*, 32% *very willing*) The dark blue segment displays the percentage of respondents who are *doing it now*. The turquoise segment indicates the percentage of property owners who are *very willing* to take on the environmental practice, and so forth (see Figure 3).

Willingness to Support Environmental/Ecological Practices

Watercrafts and Motorsports. Association members and non-members were asked to provide an inventory of the watercrafts and other motorsports that they owned (snowmobiles, ATVs, and UTVs). Based on the 114 property owners who responded to this item, 95% own between one and three canoes or kayaks and 74% own between one and three motorboats. The vast majority of owners own no sailboats (94%), no jet skis (92%), no ATV/UTVs (90%), and no snowmobiles (89%) (see Table 8).

Important Lake Uses. Shoreland property owners use the Spider chain for a range of activities throughout the year. Figure 4 combines strongly disagree and somewhat disagree for an overall percentage of disagreement and combines somewhat agree and strongly agree for an overall percentage of agreement. The figure visually displays the extent of agreement based on how high each bar "floats" above the 0% line. The result highlights the lake uses considered more important from the perspective of survey respondents, as well as those uses that are viewed as less important. The most important activities are: Enjoying nature (96%), Scenic beauty (96%), Friends and family (95%), Boating (94%), Swimming (94%), and Peace and quiet (93%). The activities viewed as less important are ATV/UTV trails (27%), harvesting food (33%), hunting or trapping (18%), snowmobiling (36%), and Irrigation (14%). Note: We have removed the neither disagree nor agree option from this figure. Therefore, the shorter the bar, the larger the percent of respondents selecting neither disagree nor agree. (Figure 4).




Figure 5. Lake Use Frequencies (n= 138 to 140)

Family Participation on or Near the Spider Chain of Lakes. Families on the Spider Chain participate in a variety of activities on or near the lake. Figure 5, lists the percentages of respondents who said that they take part in these activities never, sometimes, often, and always. The dark blue segment displays the percent of respondents who always participate in these activities. The turquoise segment indicates the percent of property owners who often participate in these activities, and so forth. The activities with the highest percentages of property owners saying always are: boating (55%), observing nature and photography (49%), canoeing/kayaking (47%), swimming (47%), and gathering with friends (46%). The activities listed most often as never are: hunting (76%), jet skiing (72%), sailing (69%), and snowmobiling (69%) (see Figure 5).

Fishing and Fishery Management




Figure 6. Do you fish? (n=141)

Do you fish? One survey item asked shoreland property owners whether or not they fished. Of the one hundred forty-one individuals who responded to this item, 80% of the respondents (n=113) said, "Yes" they do fish, while 20% respondents (n=28) indicated, "No" they do not fish (see Figure 6).




Figure 7. Fish species typically fished for (n=141)

Preferred Fish Species. Many anglers enjoy fishing for all fish species found in the Spider Chain. Survey respondents chose from a list of seven fish species found in the chain. Respondents were directed to select all species from the list for which they typically fish. One hundred forty-one respondents tallied 391 fish selections. The three species most fished for were Largemouth Bass (21%), Muskellunge (19%), and Walleye (19%), but Bluegills and Sunfish, and Crappies were also popular species. Respondents were least likely to select Northern Pike (6%) and/or other (4%) (see Figure 7).




Figure 8. Fishery Management Opinions (n=103 to 108)

Fishery Management Opinions. The survey posed 11 items in the *Fish and Fishery Management* section that related to fishery management. Figure 8 combines *strongly disagree* and *somewhat disagree* for an overall percentage of disagreement and combines *somewhat agree* and *strongly agree* for an overall percentage of agreement. The figure visually displays the extent of agreement based on how high the bar "floats" above the 0% line. Note: We have removed the *neither disagree nor agree* option from this figure. Therefore, the shorter the bar, the larger the percent of respondents selecting *neither disagree nor agree*.

Attitudes about the Lake




Figure 9. Shoreland Owner Attitudes Related to the Spider Chain (n=130 to 132)

In this section, we assessed respondents' levels of disagreement or agreement for 24 statements using the scale (*strongly disagree*, *somewhat disagree*, *neither disagree nor agree*, *somewhat agree*, and *strongly agree*). In Figure 9 below, we have combined the responses of shoreland property owners who selected *strongly disagree* and *somewhat disagree* together. We have also combined the responses of shoreland property owners who responded *somewhat agree* and *strongly agree*.⁶ The statements are ordered in the figure from those having the highest level of agreement among respondents (top of the figure) to items with the highest level of agreement among respondents who *disagreed* (near the bottom of the figure).

⁶ A double Asterix (**) placed next to the percent label signifies that 75% of the individuals who agreed (or disagreed) with the item selected *strongly agree* (or *strongly disagree*) (e.g., 84% of the respondents who disagreed with the statement, "The lake has a foul odor," selected *strongly disagree*).

There are five items near the middle of Figure 9 that have roughly equal numbers of people who *agree* with the statements as those who *disagree* with the statements. When the number of people who *agree* are about equal with the number who *disagree*, it indicates that statement is a more contentious issue among property owners. For example, 40% of respondents *disagree* with the statement, "I prefer motorized watersports to non-motorized sports" and 33% of respondents agree with that statement. Similarly, 38% of the shoreland property owners *disagree* with the statement, "The current amount of algae in the Spider Chain makes swimming less enjoyable," while 31% agree with the statement. Having said this, the remainder of those responding (about 30%) selected, *neither disagree nor agree*, meaning either that the statement is not applicable to their situation, or that they genuinely do not care (see Figure 9).

Shoreland Owner Attitudes Related to the Spider Chain

Table 9 below summarizes the same data that was presented above using a tabular format. It also presents the 11 items with the highest levels of agreement only. In the table, Column 1 displays the statement. Column 2 lists the combined percent of respondents who selected either *strongly disagree* or *somewhat disagree*. Column 3 lists the combined percent of respondents who selected either *somewhat agree* or *strongly agree*. Column 4 provides the percent of respondents who selected *strongly agree* (or *strongly disagree*). Column 5 calculates the ratios between the two response categories. For example, for the statement, "We need to preserve the 'Northwoods Character' of the area," the ratio between those who *disagree* and *agree* with the statement is 1:44, meaning that for every individual who *disagrees* with the statement, 44 people *agree* with it. This indicates a high preference for the preservation of the "Northwoods character."

Personal Views

The final two items on the survey were open-ended response items that provided shoreland property owner respondents an opportunity to share their personal perspectives. The two questions that were posed to survey takers were: (1) "List the three most important things to you about the Spider Chain", and (2) "List the three most important things that need to happen on the Spider Chain in the next 2 to 5 years." Respondents were limited to 150 words for both questions. In general, respondents listed three specific items, however, in a few instances, respondents listed only two things and in other instances respondents listed four things (this was true for both questions). For these analyses we assumed that the items listed first were relatively more important, than the items listed second, third, and fourth. For this reason, we

used a weighted count and coded the responses as follows: the first item listed was worth 4 points, the second item was worth 3 points, third item was worth 2 points, and fourth item was worth 1 point.

The analysis reveals that water quality of the lakes is the most important issue for the majority of property owners (ranked #1). Based on the findings, there is also a strong desire for a quiet place (ranked #2), and the need to preserve undeveloped and unspoiled shorelines, which shoreland owners associated with the "Northwoods character" or "wilderness" feel (ranked #3 and #4). These four top-ranked topics received 46% of the points of the 993 tallies. A relatively small number of shoreland owners completing this openended item mentioned keeping and enforcing current ski hours (4%) or expanding waterski hours (2%). Also, worth noting, the topics most closely related to environmental preservation and protection; numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 12 comprise almost two-thirds of the summed tallies (64%) (see Table 10).

Most Important Issues Two to Five Years into the Future. Property owners were asked to reflect on the most important issues for the Spider Chain to address in the next two to five years. The issues ranked #1 and #2 based on survey responses were: (1) Controlling aquatic invasive species, and (2) Enforcing Town Ordinances (esp. zoning ordinances related to building and shoreland). Water quality and fishery concerns were ranked third and fourth by the survey respondents in these open-ended items. Only a small number of individuals mentioned waterski hours, either expanded (6%) or reduced (5%), as one of their most important issues for the Spider chain in the next 2 to 5 years. This is consistent with survey respondents' opinions in the Lake Use Section where the majority of shoreland owners want waterskiing hours to remain the same, neither reduced (76% disagree) nor expanded (61% disagree). Again, we observe that the topics that most closely relate to environmental preservation and protection; numbers 1, 2, 3, 5, 7, and 16 make up more than one-half the summed tallies (52%) (see Table 11).

SUMMARY OF FINDINGS

Survey Overview

In spring 2020, the Association was awarded a \$21,500 DNR grant to develop a Comprehensive Lake Management Plan for the Spider Chain of Lakes. Goal 1 of the plan is to understand lake residents' concerns, perceptions, and motivations to enhance lake protection and increase involvement in the Spider Chain of Lakes Association. To this end, this sociological survey was created and administered to all shoreland property owners. The survey was designed to assess the attitudes and cultural behaviors that promote and impede the Association's lake protection efforts.

One hundred nineteen (119) of the 165 Association households completed the online survey (response rate of 72%). Seventy-four non-member shoreland property owners received a paper copy of the non-member survey. By the July 31 deadline, 32 of the 74 non-members had completed and returned the survey (response rate of 43%). One hundred fifty-one individuals completed the survey (n=151) and the combined response rate for all shoreland owners, members and non-members, was 63%. This response rate has a margin of error of 5% with a confidence level of 95%. This means that the reported values for any given item on the survey will fall within \pm 5% of the true percentage for the population, 95% of the

time. Based on the relatively high response rate, the calculated margin of error, and the confidence level, it is likely that the survey findings of this survey sample will be representative of the views of most shoreland property owners on the Spider chain.

Participant Residency

How the residence is used. Fifty percent of respondents (50%) reside on the Spider Chain mainly on the weekends (summers only, 11%; weekends throughout the year, 39%). Twenty-three percent (23%) of respondents report that they reside on the lake throughout the summer and more throughout the year.

Years of shoreland property ownership. A large percentage of respondents (86%) have owned their property for six or more years (6 to 10 years, 16%; 11 to 15 years, 9%; 16 or more years, 61%), while 14% of respondents have owned their property for five or fewer years (<1 year, 2%; 1 to 5 years, 12%).

SCLA Participation and Perspectives

SCLA Affiliation Status. Eighty-one percent of the individuals who responded to the survey said that they were current members of the Association and 15% said that they had never been members. Five respondents had been members of the Association in the past, but were no longer (1%).

Satisfaction with Association Activities and Efforts. The activities and efforts receiving the highest levels of satisfaction were: The Spider Lines newsletter (97%), the SCLA monthly updates (94%), and controlling aquatic invasive species (93%). Member respondents were also very satisfied with the SCLA website. Eighty-seven percent of member respondents (87%) viewed the website satisfactorily.

Importance of Association Activities and Efforts. The top four activities were controlling aquatic invasive species (96%), the *Spider Lines* newsletter (96%), the SCLA monthly updates (93%), and the SCLA website (91%).

Willingness to Provide Support to the Association. Fifty-two percent of member respondents reported that they were already providing financial support in addition to their membership fees and 29% said that they were already contributing to the Association through volunteering.

Participation and Lake Use

Willingness to Support Environmental and Ecological Practices. Eliminating the use of lead-containing fish weights and lures received the highest support with 51% of respondents reporting that they had already eliminated the use of lead-containing weights and lures and 29% indicating that they were very willing to do so. Seventy-one percent (71%) of the survey respondents indicated that they were supportive of altering their lawn practices and shoreline plantings to protect the quality of the Spider Chain (42% doing it now, 29% very willing). Fifty-three percent said that they were willing to support efforts to protect the ecological health of the Spider Chain if it meant limiting their current use of, or activities on the lake (21% doing it now, 32% very willing). These findings are consistent with and corroborated by the results of the open-ended items as well.

Watercrafts and Motorsports. Based on the responses of 114 shoreland property owners, 95% own between one and three canoes or kayaks and 74% own between one and three motorboats. The vast majority of owners own no sailboats (94%), no jet skis (92%), no ATV/UTVs (90%), and no snowmobiles (89%).

Important Lake Uses. The most important activities are: Enjoying nature (96%), Scenic beauty (96%), Family and Friends (95%), Boating (94%), Swimming (94%), and Peace and quiet (93%). The activities viewed as less important are: snowmobiling (36%), Harvesting food (33%), ATV/UTV trails (27%), Hunting or trapping (18%), and Irrigation (14%).

Family Participation on or Near the Spider Chain of Lakes. Families on the Spider Chain participate in a variety of activities on or near the lake. The activities with the highest percentages of property owners responding always are: boating (55%), observing nature and photography (49%), canoeing/kayaking (47%), swimming (47%), and gathering with friends (46%). The activities listed least often selected (never) are: hunting (76%), jet skiing (72%), sailing (69%), and snowmobiling (69%).

Fishing and Fishery Management

Do You Fish? 80% of the respondents (n=113) said, "Yes," that they do fish, while 20% respondents (n=28) indicated, "No," they do not fish.

Preferred Fish Species. The three species most fished for were Largemouth Bass (21%), Muskellunge (19%), and Walleye (19%), but Bluegills and Sunfish, and Crappies were also popular species. Respondents were least likely to select Northern Pike (6%) and other (4%).

Attitudes about the Lake

High Levels of Agreement

High levels of *agreement* were observed in the following six statements:

- I enjoy having a view of the wilderness from the water
- We need to preserve the "Northwoods Character" of the area
- The Spider Chain is a peaceful place to be
- The things I do or don't do, have an impact on the lake
- I am concerned that if the health of the lake declines, it could decrease my property value
- Maintaining peace and quiet on the lake is important to me

High Levels of Disagreement

High levels of *disagreement* were observed in the following five statements:

- I prefer lawns on my waterfront to natural vegetation
- Untouched natural vegetation in and around the lake is unattractive
- Current waterskiing hours should be reduced
- I would prefer to have more people living on and around the Spider Chain
- The lake has a foul odor

Personal Views

Most Important Issues for the Spider Chain. The analysis reveals that water quality of the lakes is the most important issue for the majority of shoreland property owners. Based on the findings, there is also a strong desire for a quiet place and a place to be in a natural environment with undeveloped shorelines and a "Northwoods" or "wilderness" feel. Only a small number of individuals mentioned waterski hours, either reduced (4%) or expanded (2%), as one of their three most important issues for the Spider chain. This triangulates well with survey respondents' opinions in the *Lake Use Section* where the majority of shoreland owners want waterskiing hours to remain the same, neither reduced (76% *disagree*) nor

expanded (61% *disagree*). Also, worth noting, the topics most closely related to environmental preservation and protection; numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, and 12 comprise almost two-thirds of the summed tallies (64%)

Most Important Issues Two to Five Years into the Future. Property owners were asked to reflect on the most important issues for the Spider Chain in the next two to five years. The issues ranked #1 and #2 based on survey responses were: (1) Controlling aquatic invasive species and (2) Enforcing Town Ordinances (esp. zoning ordinances related to building and shoreland). Water quality and fishery concerns were ranked third and fourth by the survey respondents in these open-ended items. Again, we observe that the topics that most closely relate to environmental preservation and protection; numbers 1, 2, 3, 5, 7, and 16 make up more than one half the summed tallies (52%).

CONCLUSIONS

A typical Spider chain shoreland property owner. Half of shoreland owners (50%) come to the lakes on summer weekends or weekends throughout the year. Almost nine out of ten shoreland owners (86%) have been on the Spider Chain for six or more years.

SCLA. Eight of every ten shoreland owners (81%) are members of the Spider Chain of Lakes Association. SCLA members say that the <u>most</u> important services and activities the Association provides are: controlling aquatic invasive species (96%), the *Spider Lines* newsletter (96%), the SCLA monthly updates (93%), and the SCLA website (91%).

Actions. The majority of respondents say they are very willing to do, or are already doing environmental efforts such as removing lead-containing weights and lures, altering lawn practices and shoreline plantings to improve water quality, and changing how they use the lakes in order to protect them.

Activities. Most shoreland owners own between one and three canoes or kayaks (95%) and between one and three motorboats (74%). The vast majority of owners own no sailboats (94%), no jet skis (92%), no ATV/UTVs (90%) and no snowmobiles (89%). The activities viewed as less important are: snowmobiling (36%), Harvesting food (33%), ATV/UTV trails (27%), Hunting or trapping (18%), and Irrigation (14%). Eight of every ten owners (80%) are active anglers. They prefer fishing for largemouth bass, walleyes, and muskies.

Attitudes about the Spider Chain. There are very high levels of agreement on preserving and protecting an undeveloped quality on the lakes. The vast majority of owners prefer natural shorelines, peace and quiet, and the "Northwoods" and "wilderness" character of the area. Further, they realize that what they do affects the lakes and that their shoreland property values are directly linked to the quality of the lakes. The majority do not want to see lawns. The majority of shoreland owners want waterskiing hours to remain the same, neither reduced (76%) nor expanded (61%).

Lake issues. The most important lakes issues are: maintaining water quality; peace and quiet; retaining the wilderness setting; preserving the unspoiled, undeveloped shoreline; and controlling aquatic invasive species.

Comprehensive Lake Management Plan efforts. A Comprehensive Lake Management Plan for the Spider Chain of Lakes should consider the desires of most shoreland property owners to preserve the "Northwoods" and "wilderness" nature of the lake chain. Nearly all owners say they are concerned about preserving the water quality of the lakes, preventing and controlling aquatic invasive species, and

maintaining a quality fishery. Spider Chain shoreland property owners have a strong environmental stewardship ethic and the Comprehensive Lake Management Plan should use this value as a primary guiding principle.

- 1. Protection of environment/lake quality through continued monitoring and education
- 2. Growth of SCOLA to continue mission
- 1. 4pm ski time vs 3pm.
- 2. Access to golf course bar and restaurant now that Timber Bay is closed
- 3. Continue Invasive species monitoring
- 1. Reduction of pike population
- 2. Easier entrance to clear lake
- 3. Less weeds in North Lake
- 1. Preserve the current character of the lake
- 2. Continue to support nature on the lake
- 3. Prevent invasive species of plants
- 1. Open 'fast hours' on holiday weekends to 10-4 to reduce pressure
- 2. Fund enforcement (or stop talking about) 10mph rule
- 3. Increase surveys for AIS so earliest action can be taken
- 1. Enforce existing water regulations,
- 2. regulate wake boats and
- 3. increase maximum boat speed outside of 11a-3p from 10mph to 15mph

- 1. Continue to monitor and reduce invasive species,
- 2. preserve and protect water quality and
- 3. the wilderness.
- 1. less motorized use,
- 2. water and road invasive species controlled
- 3. keep lakeshore limits so we don't turn into the Dells shoreline with so many houses
- 1. Maintain our shoreline zoning within reason, but allow reasonable repairs to existing homes and cabins,
- 2. continue to monitor the landing, and
- 3. continuing to monitor invasives.
- 1. Food and gas on the lake,
- 2. Control of aquatic species,
